



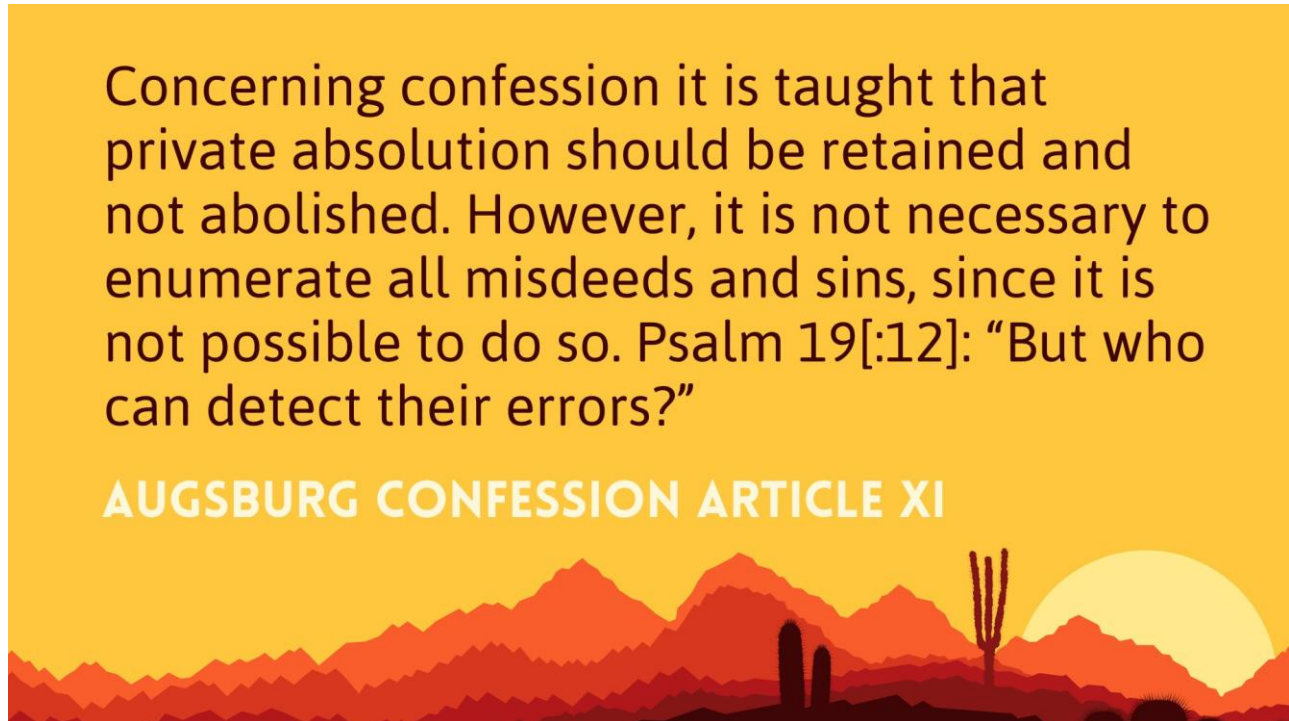
Can you think of a time that left you with a sense of awe and amazement at God, perhaps thinking to yourself or reflecting to other people, “I’ve never felt closer to God!” Growing up, I remember youth gatherings and camp experiences gave me many of those times. The Psalms share this experience many times over like in Psalm 95, “Shout for joy to God, all the earth; sing the glory of his name; give to him glorious praise! Say to God, “How awesome are your deeds!” Reveling in God’s greatness is good!

On the flip side I’ve heard many times people say after a tragic death, or accident, people reflect on how they feel distant from God. Sometimes they will share they feel as though God has abandoned them. It reminds me of Psalm chapter 22, where God allows us to express out of faith the depth of our own brokenness, the hurt we have, and the weight of sin echoing what Jesus spoke from the cross, “My God, My God, why have you forsaken me? Why are *you so far* from saving me...” These two sides of human experience impact confession and absolution. The teaching of confession is the XI article of the Augsburg Confession.

Now imagine for a moment standing in church during the worship service as we go through confession and during the time of silence trying to list all your sins silently to yourself. Would you be able to list them all? What if more time was given, would you want to get through all of them? Now if there was a law and expectation to do that once a year, not in your head, but privately to the pastor. In 1215 with the conclusion of the Fourth Lateran Council, there was a law passed which commanded every Christian to confess all their sins at least once a year to their own priest, usually taking place around Easter. Now you are beginning to see the historical background to the XI article of the Augsburg Confession.

One of the greatest harms that came from forced confession of sins was the damage done to the consciences of each Christian. Now confession was a burden to make sure you listed all your sins. It’s not as though the church didn’t believe in the forgiveness of sins. In this sense forgiveness was not forgotten, but twisted. The free gift of forgiveness on account of Jesus’ righteous merits was being smothered underneath works, traditions (without explanation), and many burdensome laws like the one mentioned earlier.

Think back to our example of a “spiritual high” or “spiritual valley”. The requirement of listing all sins during confession began to be a reinforcement for people that God “was far away from saving us” (Psalm 22). Is this how you are taught in our church about confessing our sins and receiving God’s forgiveness on account of Jesus? Hopefully not, as Article XI, “Concerning Confession” states:



Psalm 130:3-4 says, “If you, O Lord, kept a record of sins, O Lord, who could stand? But with you there is forgiveness, that you may be feared.” This gets at the heart of what all confession of sins, public and private, should drive us toward. Telling God what has burdened us, especially what we can remember, then turn to God in fear, love and trust! For example, that might mean confessing out spiritual mountain tops or valleys are not beyond the need for God’s forgiveness and grace even as he was in both places.

We teach that private confession and absolution is a good and beneficial gift for a Christian to be involved in, in history the church went too far in demanding it be a law. But today? Well sometimes we need a little help¹ reflecting on the weight of our sins, not to burden our consciences, but to see that God is nearby, not far away for he never forsakes us in Jesus Christ.

ELDER'S CORNER

Be the Light, Not the Noise

Every generation of Christians faces a temptation: to borrow the world's methods for advancing God's Kingdom. In our era, that method is the protest — the march, the sign, the chant. Christians pour into the streets alongside their neighbors, certain that visibility and volume will shift the moral direction of the culture. But I want to ask a harder question: Is this what Jesus had in mind? And is it actually working? I don't think it is. And more importantly, I think Scripture points us toward something far more powerful — and far more demanding.

What Jesus Said About Changing the World

Jesus lived under Roman occupation, among people who desperately wanted a revolution. Many of His own followers expected Him to lead one. He did not. Instead, He said:

“You are the light of the world. A city set on a hill cannot be hidden... let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father who is in heaven.”
— Matthew 5:14–16 (ESV)

Notice what He does not say. He doesn't say, “Make yourself heard.” He doesn't say, “Force your convictions on the culture.” He says: let your light shine through your good works, so that others glorify God. The method is a life well-lived. The goal is that people are drawn to the Father. This is not passive — it is in fact the most demanding standard imaginable, because it requires that your entire life become the witness.

Earning the Question

Peter builds on this in 1 Peter 3:15–16: “Always be prepared to make a defense to anyone who asks you for a reason for the hope that is in you; yet do it with gentleness and respect.” The key phrase is “who asks you.” Peter envisions a Christian living in such a way that others become genuinely curious. They see something — a peace, a generosity, a love for enemies — that they cannot explain on their own terms. So, they ask. And that question, born from a real relationship and earned over time, is the open door the Spirit has been preparing.

Nobody has ever been argued into the Kingdom. Nobody changes overnight. Faith grows slowly, watered by years of watching someone live differently. The Christian's most powerful apologetic is not a clever argument or a compelling sign — it is a life that raises questions only the Gospel can answer.

The Easy Way Is Usually the Wrong Way

Here is an uncomfortable truth: protest is easy. You show up, you march, you feel righteous, you go home. But feelings of activism and actual impact are very different things. Real issues have real nuance — nuance that cannot survive a slogan. A sign is a battle cry, not an argument. It rallies those who already agree and hardens those who don't.

The hard way is to work. To prove yourself. To build genuine relationships across lines of disagreement. To become someone whose character gives weight to their words. This is slow. It is unglamorous. It does not trend on social media. But it is the only thing that has ever produced lasting change in the heart of another human being. And individual hearts are the only place where culture actually lives.

Jesus didn't organize mass demonstrations. He walked with twelve people for three years. He ate with sinners. He touched lepers. He noticed the woman at the well, the tax collector in the tree, the thief on the cross beside Him. He changed the world one person at a time, through the kind of deliberate, costly, personal attention that no march can replicate. And He calls us to do the same.

What the Early Church Knew

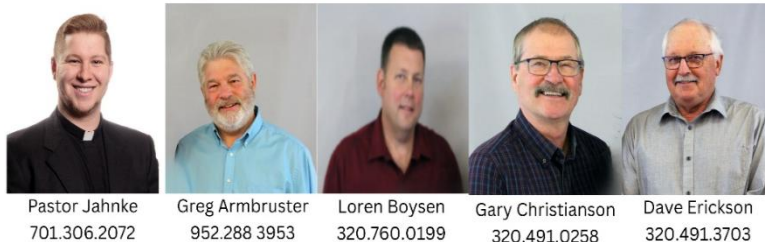
The early church did not grow through political pressure or public spectacle. It grew because ordinary Christians lived remarkably different lives — serving the poor, caring for the sick, treating the outcast with dignity, loving their enemies. The early church father Tertullian recorded the pagans saying of Christians: "See how they love one another." That was their sign. That was their testimony. And it was irresistible.

We have largely forgotten this. We have traded the slow, faithful, person-by-person work of genuine Christian witness for the short-term emotional satisfaction of being publicly seen on the right side of an issue. But God is not impressed by our signs. He is looking for our fruit.

Do the Hard Thing

If you want to change your community — if you want to bring people to Christ — do the hard thing. Work with excellence. Be a faithful friend, spouse, and neighbor. Serve without recognition. Engage with those who disagree, not to win an argument, but to understand a person. Build relationships that give your words roots.

Live in such a way that when people see the fruit of your faith — your integrity, your peace, your love for people who have not earned it — they come to you and ask why. That moment of genuine curiosity, born from years of faithful living, is worth more than a thousand marches. It is the moment the Holy Spirit has been preparing all along.



The world does not need more noise.

It needs more light. Be the light.

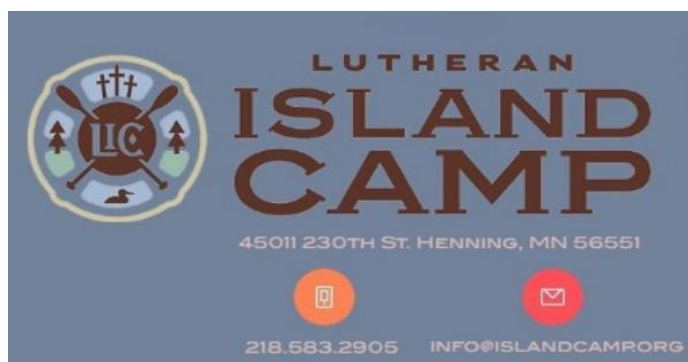
Our box for Love Inc incentive items is still in the hallway. This is an ongoing incentive and you may donate to this at any time.
